Tribute to Henrique Nicolini

Dear friends panathlets,

When I started writing this editorial, I learned of the sad news of the sudden death of our Honorary Member Henrique Nicolini. With Henrique Nicolini, we lose more than a big panathleta. We were deprived of an exceptional man.

Henrique Nicolini represented our Movement in all Panathlon Clubs in Latin America. He represented what Panathlon desires most of all: the spreading of the educational and moral values of sport. We will dedicate to him the next issue of our magazine, paying tribute to this good man as he deserves. At this moment, our thoughts and condolences go to his wife Lilian and his sons Cecilia, Augusta, Dulce and Ana Maria. Henrique Nicolini has maintained an intact faith in the ideal values of sport and this belief was contagious.



Today, we have a great need to keep this vision voluntarily optimistic. A few days ago, on a mountain hike, my wife and I met a friend, a Swiss sports executive and head of a cantonal sports service. He expressed this thought: "But how can you still believe in what you do for sport?"

Personally, I am disgusted by all the scandals that media broadcast us every week." This observation has fueled our conversation throughout the rest of our walk. Because here we are confronted with this finding: cases of corruption and generalized cheating on doping seem to multiply. To the doping practices already mentioned in the McLaren report in 2016, of which all the consequences are not yet known, must be added the suspects of corruption in the Olympic Games in Rio, with the appearance of some famous name, an integral part of the family of the Olympic Games to which we belong. Recently, this summer, riots broke out for a power struggle within the international boxing federation and announced on the front page of newspapers. We have the feeling of accelerating scandals in the world of sports, which can only increase public distrust of sport in general.

Considering this statement, what can and which should be the reaction of panathletes? We are not an ordinary public. Our experience in the different areas of sport drives us to reflect and to refrain from judging only with emotion. This also helps us to focus on our goals, which are the spread of the ideal values of sport. It is in this context that lies our competence, strength and efficiency. Panathlon does not have the task of effectively fighting against proven corruption, against doping in high-level athletes. We must continue our work of public information, and training of the young man. It is in this task that our clubs excel, and this is our mission.

This leads me to say a few words about our ongoing actions: the new, more attractive and modern web site has come. Later, the President's Committee will focus on some modifications that need to be made, with the help of the website designer, Luigi Innocenzi, Governor of Area 05 Emilia-Romagna; we would like to thank him for his very generous engagement.

The PI Delegation at the European Institutions was inaugurated in Brussels in June in the presence of the Past President of the Council of Europe, Herman Van Rompuy, of Deputy Director General for Education and Culture of the European Commission, Nymand Christensen and of Hannu Takkula, Member of the European Parliament. Numerous Panathlon International executives and representatives of Belgian clubs were present.

The PI Delegation in Lausanne at the main headquarters of the world sport is about to be realized. It will be structured around specific projects realized with the help of local clubs and of course the IOC. This autumn, Latin America will be on stage and will be my first visit to the Buenos Aires Club for its 50th anniversary. Buenos Aires was the first Panathlon Club in Latin America in 1967. At the end of October, the Pan-American Congress will be held in Recife, with the presence of a European delegation. Finally, I will take advantage of my trip to Chile in November at a congress of judges to visit our Chilean Clubs.

PANATHLON IS PRESENT IN THE HEART OF EUROPE

A representation office in Brussels to foster a direct approach with the European institutions and participate in choices of sports policy.

The dream started in 2015 is now a reality: Panathlon International has its own representation office in Brussels, the heart of Europe and the origin of Community policies in the field of sport as well.

The dream started when Vic De Donder, the late President of the District Belgium and the Cultural Commission, came to propose this ambitious project to the International Presidency as a service initiative for the benefit of all panathletes. He soon found open doors and the preparatory meetings in Brussels began with the help of some Belgian panathletes, first of all Paul Standaert, current international board member and

Philippe Vlaeminck, a well-known lawyer specializing in community practices who made available his studio for the project.

Two priority objectives for the functioning of this operation cell were identified: the first was to enter directly with Panathlon International in the bodies that talk about sport as Community policy and thus contribute to incorporating into the norms the values that Panathlon represents.

The first great encouragement came in 2015 when the Commissioner for Youth, Education and Sport, Tibor Navracsics, received the then International Presi-



dent, Giacomo Santini and Thierry Zintz in his studio, deeply interested in the history and role of Panathlon in international sport. After just two weeks, Panathlon was already included in the EU Transparency Register and admitted to a direct dialogue with the European Commission, and a few months later, in the city of The Hague, it signed a Memorandum of Understanding for participation in EWOS, the most important European event promoted by the European Commission in Brussels.

The second goal of the representation office is to create a task force to help Panathlon clubs who want to present European projects to obtain valid technical assistance. In this case, the office of the Panathlete Vlaeminck is a guarantee. The initiative was resumed with conviction even after the presidential changes at international and national level, with the election of Pierre Zappelli and Thierry Zintz.

The venue is at Avenue des Arts 43, that is, one step from the Community Buildings and in a building that houses other Institutions with which we can start profitable collaborations. Numerous guests attended the inauguration ceremony, including Herman Van Rompuy, Past President of the European Council, Jens-Nymand-Christensen, Deputy Director General for Education, Culture and Sport at the European Commission, Hanna Takkula, Finnish member of the European Parliament, representatives of sports federations and associations.

On behalf of Panathlon International, in addition to President Pierre Zappelli, were present Past President Giacomo Santini who launched the initiative together with Vic De Donder, Paul Standaert, the International Board Member who was a great guide, the former International Board Member, Paul De Broe and Prof. Yves Vanden Auweele, a former member of the Cultural and Scientific Commission and author of a very important book on ethics and sport. On behalf of the District Italy Pietro Pallini was present as vice president. Secretary General Simona Callo also attended the ceremony.

Presidents Zappelli and Zintz, in their interventions that we present in their entirety, explained the great significance of the achievement.



In the heart of the European Institutions

Speech by Thierry Zintz, President of District Belgium

Distinguished guests and friends,

It is a privilege, as a president of the Belgian District of Panathlon International, to welcome you in this representation of PI to the European Institutions in Brussels. I would like to focus my short message on two main topics, namely the why and the how of Panathlon in Belgium, and the Scientific Commission of PI.

Panathlon Clubs, in Belgium, are dedicated to the cause of sport. They deal essentially with sport's culture and ethics. They are non-governmental, non-profit-making, non-political associations, without gender or racial distinction, as it is requested from all Panathlon clubs in the world. We have eight clubs in Belgium, over the 3 communities. They act on the field of sport but also provide guidance and reflections on sports values and ethics to all stakeholders of sport.

The Belgian clubs, considering the presence of European institutions on their national territory, are keen to embrace the targets of Commissioner Navracsics and the European institutions for a sport that makes it healthier, fairer and better governed.

Meanwhile they also take specific initiatives at Belgian level, such as the "Sport, the Spirit of Humanity" symposium held on Friday 31st March 2017, in the Congress Hall at the House of Representatives. On the occasion of this symposium initiated by the Panathlon Wallonie – Bruxelles Club, key representatives from the religions represented in Belgium, as well as from secularism, Olympic and sporting movements, Paralympics, Belgian Special Olympics and Panathlon itself, adopted an impactful declaration.

The main conclusion of this declaration was that while all sportspeople have their own values and philosophies about life and belonging, when they take part in the activities covered in the declaration, they readily accept as soon as they enter their particular sporting arena, without exception, that while they are enjoying their own sport they will adhere to the rules, in the broadest sense, without highlighting in any way their philosophical beliefs in an ostentatious or intolerant manner.

All these representatives also agreed to disseminate the terms of this declaration and comment on them in their respective communities so that sport and sporting activity, including for leisure, should develop strongly, that "living and enjoying sport together" and its values should become universal values.

Parallel to Belgian initiatives, **Panathlon International has a Cultural and Scientific Commission.** The main duty of this commission is to support two of the main goals of Panathlon International namely

- presenting suggestions to handle acute and chronic problems in sport;
- stimulating reflection and discussion on “ethics and integrity” (using both a values-based and a rules-based approach) in modern sport that is based on scientific research.

This task is fulfilled in documents and congresses that are organized every odd year. It is in this spirit that the scientific Commission offered to the board of PI to focus the 2018 PI Congress on the following topic “Education in sport and through sport - connecting values, physical literacy and well-being”.

BRUSSELS AND LOSANNA INTERNATIONAL TIES

Speech by President Pierre Zappelli



Dear Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen, dear friends,

There were several milestones in the life of our Movement and today's opening ceremony of our Representation in Brussels is one of them.

What is Panathlon International and what does it intend to do in Brussels?

Panathlon was founded in 1951 in Italy, 65 years ago, precisely in Venice, by a few enthusiasts; in the aftermath of war, that was a time when the need for ideals and moral values was keenly felt. Since the very beginning, the Movement was aiming at promoting and safeguarding the moral values of Sport. We of course still believe in this ideal.

Panathlon developed at first in its home country. After setting up several Clubs outside of Italy, namely in Switzerland, Austria, France, Belgium, then in Brazil and Argentina, our Movement has gradually acquired an international profile.

Now present in 4 continents, Panathlon International is leveraging on approximately 300 Clubs Panathlon is recognized by the IOC, and is partner with other international organisations such as the International Fair Play Committee (CIFP), the European Fair Play Movement (EFPM), the International Pierre de Coubertin Committee and the World Union of Olympic Cities, just to mention a few.

And we work with these organizations so as, at the European level, with the European authorities.

Why has Panathlon begun to extend its structure outside of Italy?

We have a wonderful and effective head-office in Rapallo, Italy. For 65 years now, all PI's activities have been managed from these headquarter.

Nonetheless Panathlon International remains unknown to many. Being unknown turns out into subdued and modest effectiveness.



As of today, sports-related activities have become globalised. An international network committed to sport and its values is gaining ground worldwide.

Sport is today's buzzword. A movement called «Thin-sport» has even taken shape in Lausanne, the world capital of sports – and that's saying a lot!

Panathlon International has the unique feature – and the great advantage – of being the only sport-centred movement to have the capacity to act in the field, to spread the idea of sport inspired by fair play.

This is exactly our uniqueness as well as our strength. And we wish to make this strength known for the benefit of all. We want to raise awareness about it among sports organisations and federations, National Olympic Committees, universities, public bodies, States, regions and – I come straight to the point – among the European authorities which are increasingly involved in sport, in its benefits and its educational value.

This is a matter of legitimate preoccupation, since what we are seeing in the world of sport sometimes gives us reason for concern. Such threats go under the names of doping, even at high institutional levels, and corruption. Panathlon International's mission is not to fight against these threats after they have been proven, since other institutions are pursuing that goal more effectively – IOC, international sports federations, WADA etc. We have a more unassuming mission, one which is

however geared to be active, in the field, in close contact with the people and, in particular, with the young. It is focused on education and on promoting the ideal values conveyed by sport.

For that purpose, PI has adopted 4 Charters: the *Panathlete Charter*, *Fair Play Charte*, *Charter for sporting rights of the young*, included in the Panathlon Declaration on ethics in youth sport, *Charter of Duties of Parents in Sport*.

Among other actions, we intend to disseminate the moral values reflected in these documents throughout the world with the help of our clubs.

Your presences here, Mr. President Van Rompuy, Mr. Deputy Director general Jens Nyman Christensen, Mr. Hanna Takkula, are the proofs that the task we have set for ourselves is commanding interest in the eyes of the European authorities.

It is an honour for us all.

We have decided to bring our Movement closer to the European authorities. The impetus was given in 2015 by Vic de Donder, our late President of District Belgium and Chairman of the Culture Commission, a true man of culture and action.

Today, less than 2 years later, this ceremony marks the official opening of PI representation in Brussels. But we have already started work, in particular through our active participation in the European Week of Sport (EWOS) in 2016. We will confirm our participation for the coming years.

I would also like to mention the huge work done by District Belgium, under the guidance of its President Thierry Zintz, and by its 8 Clubs which do an incredible job on the ground, in particular for the promotion of Fair-Play.

In the meantime, the outlines of further projects to be undertaken by our representation in Brussels in the coming months are already taking shape.

I would like, at this point, to express my special thanks to the team who has worked so hard to set up this representation, mentioning in particular Mister Philippe Vlaemminck, who generously shared his premises to host this outpost of PI, his team: Ms Beata Guzik, Justine Van den Bon and Louis Van Hoeck, Mr. Paul Standaert, PI Board member and PI representative in Belgium not forgetting Mr. Paul de Broe, pas PI Board Member.

Finally, after Brussels, our expansion will continue with the setting-up of another 'branch' of our Movement in Lausanne, the world centre of sport. But this is going to be another adventure we shall be able to talk about in the next few months.

the scope of all these steps is to give to our Movement, in collaboration with the other above-mentioned organization, more influence in the world of sport, and therefore more capacity of realizing its main goals: promoting and safeguarding the moral values of Sport. Let me again express my heartfelt gratitude for your presence here, for the encouragement we get from you and... long live Panathlon!

THE EUROPEAN SPORT CHARTER AND THE CODE OF SPORTS ETHICS

Panathlon International member of APES/EPAS, the agreement extended to 41 Countries for a clean sport and the fight against doping, betting and violence in the stadiums

In the realm of sport, Europe was perceived as a geographical area and a community long before the will for co-operation began to assert itself at the political level.

At the foundation of the **Council of Europe on 5 May 1949**, the ten founding members declared their intention to carry out “common action in economic, social, cultural, scientific, legal and administrative matters”, leading to the adoption of the **European Cultural Convention** in 1954. Sport was brought within the institutional ambit of the Council of Europe in **1976** with the creation of the **Steering Committee for the Development of Sport (CDDS)**. This committee was assigned the task of actively promoting the fundamental values of the Council of Europe (human rights, parliamentary democracy, rule of law) in and through sport - which was thus also expected to honour the Organisation’s ideals!

The main thrust of Council of Europe policy on sport has been to uphold certain principles: **the independence and self-regulation of sport; the prevention of certain adverse phenomena** (such as doping and spectator violence). Sports activities throughout Europe are supported and guided by the adoption of a hundred or more Council of Europe texts (recommendations, declarations, resolutions and conventions).

The independence of sport has constituted an essential principle in the dialogue between governmental and non-governmental representatives of the sports sector. States are interested not only in the development of sport, but also in sport’s potential influence on other areas of official action such as prevention of discrimination, promotion of health, and integration.

The strategic documents **European Convention on Spectator Violence¹, Anti-Doping Convention², European Sport Charter and Code of Sports Ethics³** have not merely influenced sports activities at the European level, but also form a worldwide reference for the enlightened commitment of public authorities to healthy sport.

Importance of sport in Europe

Modern sport is an important economic sector that today represents an average of some 2% of each European country’s gross domestic product (GDP) and affords employment opportunities and specialist openings which

help increase European competitiveness.

Sport is the principal activity organised on a non-governmental and voluntary basis in Europe, and has more participants and voluntary workers than any other activity. Sport is also the most widely covered activity on the broadcast media and in the press. The major championships attract an audience of several billion.

European sport is the best organised in the world and has a calendar crowded with top-class matches. Its championships and events are followed all over the world and command the highest fees for sales and broadcasting, thereby showing the rest of the world one of Europe’s essential cultural activities.

Sport is a fundamental pillar of civil society.

It constitutes a universally accessible and readily understandable means of disseminating certain essential values in day-to-day life; sport is the most widespread type of non-formal activity next to school or work. If played properly, sport makes for the promotion of the following in particular:

- democracy and participation;
- personal commitment and individual motivation;
- social integration and cohesion;
- education and health;
- respect for others;
- co-operation and competition abiding by rules;
- development of “sport business” in a limited number of disciplines;
- good governance, ethics, independence (conflicts between law and sport)
- health (obesity), transformation of community-based and voluntary activity.

Actual needs of Council of Europe member states in the sports sector

The European sports movement is extensively organised within a geographical entity corresponding to the “Greater Europe” of the Council of Europe. These states face common challenges and share a model for sport.

It is therefore indispensable that a common platform be developed for the states belonging to this wider Europe in order to resolve common problems at the European level, discuss matters arising at the level of each state,

and establish a common European position for influencing the decisions of the international community.

However, the Council of Europe member states have not all attained the same level of development in sport and thus do not have the same experience of it. Although the rules and standards applicable to the various sports are the same everywhere, there are marked social, cultural, economic, organisational and spatial differences between states. Consequently, the impending needs will require an approach that must be differentiated in some respects.

Council of Europe competence regarding sport

The specific approach adopted by the Council of Europe, which has brought together the governments and the interested NGOs, has allowed dialogue and profitable co-operation to be initiated on the basis of a common aim.

Through the years, the Council of Europe has built up significant competence in specialised areas concerning quality assurance in sport, thanks to the agreements adopted at the political level, not only in Europe but worldwide.

How can the Council of Europe meet the sports needs of states?

In the Action Plan of the Third Summit of the Council of Europe (Warsaw, 2005) the Heads of State and Government reaffirm the great importance attached to the furtherance of sport.

The European Ministers meeting in Moscow for their 17th informal meeting in 2006 stressed the need to conceive new forms of pan-European co-operation, and encouraged the Council of Europe to continue its action

in the realm of sport. They came out in favour of establishing an Enlarged Partial Agreement on Sport (EPAS)⁴.

The EPAS created in May 2007 was established on a permanent basis by the Committee of Ministers on 13 October 2010. It is intended to establish international standards and develop a framework for a pan-European platform of intergovernmental sports co-operation in order to promote sport and make it healthier, fairer and better governed.

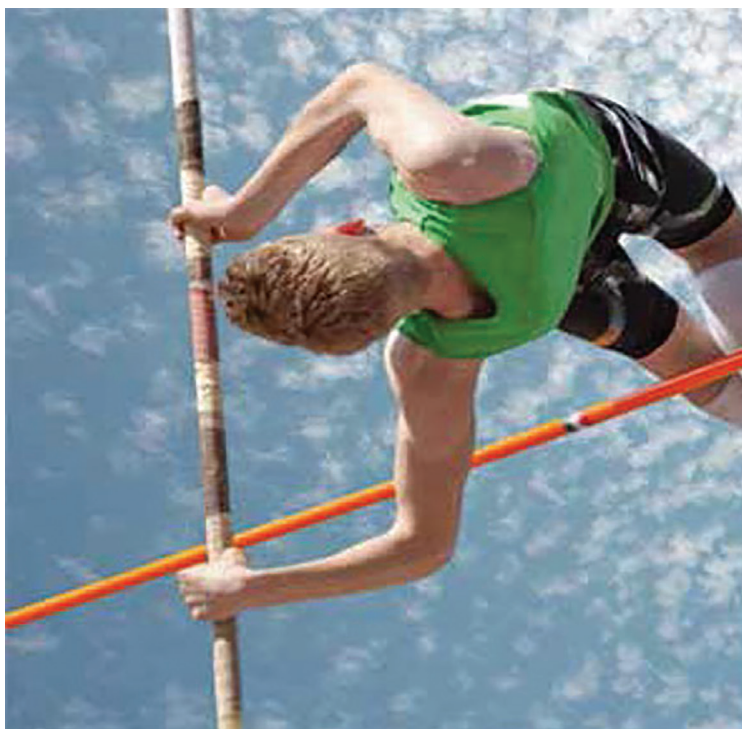
It prepares the way for better-directed action where sport is concerned, and strengthens partnerships with the sports movement. Through its Consultative Committee, the sports NGOs will be able to participate in the process of determining the EPAS programme of activities.

What is APES/EPAS

Enlarged Partial Agreement on Sport (EPAS)

On 11 May 2007, the Council of Europe adopted Resolution CM/Res(2007)8, establishing the Enlarged Partial Agreement on Sport (EPAS), in order to give fresh momentum to pan-European sports co-operation and address the current challenges facing sport in Europe – building on more than thirty years of activity in the field.

EPAS provides a platform for intergovernmental sports co-operation between the public authorities of its member states. It also encourages dialogue between public authorities, sports federations and NGOs. This contributes to better governance, with the aim of making sport healthier and fairer and ensuring that it conforms to high ethical standards.

EPAS aims to promote the development of sport in modern society, while emphasizing its positive values. It develops policies and standards, monitors them and helps with capacity-building and the exchange of good practices. It uses Council of Europe sports standards such as the European Sports Charter, the Code of Sports Ethics, the European Convention on Spectator Violence, the Anti-Doping Convention and the Convention on the Manipulation of Sports Competitions as the basis for drawing up its own strategies.

One of its key recent achievements was the preparation of the new Convention on the Manipulation of Sports Competitions, which was opened for signature on 18 September 2014. Since 2015, the EPAS programme of activities has included events to further promote this new convention and prepare its implementation.

Different recommendations initially prepared by EPAS have been adopted by the Council of Europe's Committee of Ministers on issues of sports ethics, the autonomy of the sports movement, the fight against match-fixing and the protection of child and young athletes from dangers associated with migration. Other recommendations such as the European Sports Charter or the Recommendation on the facilities for granting of visas to sportsmen and sportswomen are

regularly monitored. The new Recommendation on Gender mainstreaming in sport is the most recent. In the past, awareness-raising and co-operation activities have been carried out on social inclusion and the promotion of diversity in and through sport, focusing successively on different groups (ethnic minorities, persons with disabilities, women, children, persons in detention, etc.). In 2015, activities focused on tolerance and diversity through the teaching of physical education in constant co-operation with the Pestalozzi Project of the Council of Europe. Cooperation with the European Union and the sporting movement continued in 2015 through the implementation of joint projects (including the development of the Pro Sport Safe project in June 2015 focusing on the protection of the moral and physical integrity of the young athletes). Follow-up co-operation activities with possible new projects relating to EPAS thematic priorities will continue.

Finally, Council of Europe Conferences of Ministers responsible for Sport continue to be organized regularly thanks to EPAS (Athens 2008, Baku 2010, Belgrade 2012, Macolin/Magglingen 2014, and Budapest 2016).

Forty-one countries are currently members of EPAS. Twenty-eight sports organizations (including SportAccord, ENGSO, UEFA, the IOC and Panathlon International) are partners of EPAS making up its Consultative Committee.

Résolution de l'APES sur la fermeture de l'UNOSDP

Le Comité Consultatif (CC) de l'Accord Partiel Élargi sur le Sport (APES) du Conseil de l'Europe se déclare préoccupé par la fermeture soudaine du Bureau du Conseiller spécial du Secrétaire Général pour le Sport au service du Développement et de la Paix, (UNOSDP). Depuis le début du siècle, l'UNOSDP a joué un rôle important de catalyseur, conseiller et défenseur pour un large groupe de partenaires dont l'objectif est le renforcement du rôle du sport dans la société.

Considérant que cette décision est très récente et que peu d'informations ont circulé, il est impossible à ce stade d'en évaluer l'impact de manière mesurée.

Le CC de l'APES considère néanmoins que cette décision constitue un message pour le moins ambigu, alors que la prise de conscience globale de l'importance du rôle sociétal du sport ne cesse de s'accroître. De plus, la volonté de recourir au sport pour atteindre les objectifs de développement durable 2030 n'a jamais été aussi forte, particulièrement de la part de l'ONU, de plusieurs gouvernements et de la société civile.

Les membres du CC de l'EPAS confirment leur engagement à poursuivre les initiatives développées par l'UNOSDP et souhaitent que les futures politiques établies dans ce domaine fassent l'objet d'une large consultation des parties prenantes, ceci afin de permettre la défense et la protection du rôle du sport dans la société.

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Le Comité Consultatif (CC) est composé de 25 institutions et organisations non gouvernementales internationales du domaine du sport. En tant qu'organisation partenaire, il conseille les 38 Pays membres Comité Consultatif (CC) de l'Accord partiel élargi sur le Sport (APES) du Conseil de l'Europe.

APES fournit une plateforme pour une coopération intergouvernementale entre les autorités publiques et ses États membres. Il encourage également le dialogue entre autorités publiques, les fédérations sportives et les ONG. Cette approche contribue à une meilleure gouvernance avec le but de rendre le sport plus sain et juste pour qu'il soit conforme au standard éthique le plus élevé.

SPORT, THE SPIRIT OF HUMANITY

A Declaration for a better “sportsmanship together”, produced and signed as the result of the conference “Sport, the spirit of humanity”

On March 31, 2017, at the initiative of Panathlon Wallonie-Bruxelles, took place in the Belgian Senate and under the auspices of its President, Ms. Christine Defraigne, the second part of the conference “Sport, the spirit of humanity ».

This brought together the world of sport, philosophical movements and all the recognized religious cultures, namely: The Belgian Bishops' Conference, the Israelite Jewish Central Consistory, the Anglican Worship Committee, the Orthodox Metropolis of Belgium, the Muslim Executive of Belgium, the Protestant Council,

An important historical moment that ended with the signing by everyone of a statement aimed at ensuring the primacy of sport rules on the philosophical and religious convictions of each person, in accordance with the rules of life-together promulgated by our

legislators.

The aim of this initiative was to underline the universal values of sport and was based on the results of a first interview held in October 2016 in another important place of Belgian citizenship: the Parliament of the Walloon-Brussels Federation.

In fact, the theme of digital and virtual development and the consequent removal of young people from sports practice had been deepened and highlighted; that the interest of man in sport and/or physical activity has never been so strong; that a regular sports practice has beneficial effects on health and personal development; that current society is the victim of discontent of the communities involved.

It seemed appropriate to remember that, first of all, sport is a vehicle for reconciliation, meeting, exchange and values. The drafting of a unifying text template has been presented to all the representatives of the











cults, philosophical currents and sports associations; of course, before they confirmed it, all were invited to comment on the Declaration. Afterwards, Panathlon Wallonie-Brussels will spread the Declaration at an international level as an example to follow.

Frei, journalist and record holder of the olympics

He was present at the hostage-taking during the Games of 1972, and in 2004, he carried the Olympic torch: journalist and sportscaster, Peter A. Frei told the story of 24 Olympic Games and for this reason he was honored in Rio. Frei is a great athletic connoisseur and he received the Swiss Athletics brooch as a prize.

The Winter Games in Sapporo in 1972 were his first Olympics, the Summer Games in Rio de Janeiro for now, the last Olympics - Peter A. Frei has uninterruptedly told us about the Olympic Games as a sports journalist. For 24 times in all. This is almost a world record. At the beginning of the Games, Frei seemed to be the number one. Later, however, the International Association of Sports Journalists AIPS pulled out of the hat someone who had participated in more Olympic games, the Italian journalist Giuliano Bevilacqua. He has accompanied 25 Olympic Games with his reportage. AIPS honored the two men in Rio, along with some other veterans. Among other things, Prince Albert of Monaco personally congratulated them; he had represented his country five times as a bobsledder in the Winter Games. Among the illustrious guests there were for example former American sprinter Michael Johnson and IOC Vice President Nawal El Moutawakel - the first Muslim woman in the history of the Games who won a gold medal.

Fürstentfeldbrück, and some international agencies announced that the hostages had been released. A German colleague said to him, "It cannot be; they are shooting here!" The two went to Fürstentfeldbrück, but they were not allowed to enter and so they listened to the radio from outside. "Then we knew that all eleven were dead and were not released," Frei says. Shortly after, they noticed the passage of stretchers full of dead and injured. Peter A. Frei was at that time the news director at the "Blick". Until 5 o'clock that night, he wrote a special edition on the hostage-taking that was then sold for 20 cents in the stations of Zurich and Berne.

Delivered the Olympic torch to Piccard
Athens 2004 memories are happier. In each country, the IOC was looking for a journalist who had participated in several Olympic Games, and that he was a correspondent in Athens. Therefore, "Paf" had the honor to carry the torch for a few hundred meters - to pass it to Bertrand Piccard. It is not yet known if Frei will also participate in the next Games - Winter Games scheduled in Pyeongchang. A man of 72 years old, who in his career has mostly talked about alpine skiing, athletics and sports policy, makes his decision dependent on how much a 25th time can still stimulate him. Peter A. Frei was for a long time an administrator and editor in chief of the SI Sports Information that at the beginning of 2016 was integrated into the SDA press agency.

MY OLYMPICS FROM SKIING IN CORTINA TO SAILING IN ATLANTA

My first Olympics were the Winter Games of 1956, in Cortina d'Ampezzo. An unforgettable experience that, however, I experienced with great emotion, but without the pathos of the agonistic participation.

I was present, in fact, as a collaborator of Coni, engaged in the first great post-war organizing event in a country that was completing its reconstruction after the war events, called to collaborate as a third year student of the Higher institute of physical education (ISEF) in Rome. Instead, my first "real" Olympics came forty years later, in 1996, at the Olympic Games in Atlanta, as the team leader of the Italian Olympic sailing team.

The racing field was located in Savannah, a city on the Atlantic Ocean, about 400 miles away from Atlanta, but it did not stop us from living fully the emotions that characterize the atmosphere of the five circles. Participation in the Olympics is the ultimate goal for an athlete, a coach, and an executive.

For a team leader in such a particular discipline as sailing, the important thing is to do his utmost to give his athletes maximum support in athletic training, material research, specific technique as well as creating an environment of calm and determination to be able to better face the regattas and selections before participation in the great event. My work of team leader started far away from the lighting of the Olympic flame. In 1993, we set a different approach to tackling regattas and having a clearer and objective selection criterion; we identified the emerging crews and decided to bring the best crew to Savannah in all ten predefined Olympic classes.

We had set the annual goals of verifying the work done; we chose to select the Olympic team in May 1995. We followed the programs closely with Coni. The staff who followed us consisted of a sports director, coaches of the individual classes, sports doctor, athletic trainer, a meteorologist, a psychologist of the Sports School of Coni. Once we passed the selections in some classes and evaluated the merits of others, we participated in the Olympic regattas with the full team. Given the results of the various world and European championships and international and pre-Olympic races, our hopes of medals appeared very concrete.

Unfortunately, Olympic regattas disregarded our expectations, achieving only a bronze medal with Alessandra Sensini. Our crews did not respond adequately to the pressure and responsibility that this great event requires and that it strains the great champions.

The great euphoria and the great enthusiasm experienced during the inaugural ceremony at the Atlanta Stadium were not enough to earn us the long-dreamed medals.

Memories of Rio WOULD BUT I CANNOT

With the term **“jeitinho”**, the inhabitants of Rio de Janeiro define the art of arranging themselves, a matter in which most Carioca graduates with honors. A training that crosses different ages and includes every social class, so it is true that this concept was also celebrated in the evocative and at times sumptuous opening ceremony of the Olympic Games.

Obviously, the “jeitinho” is daily bread in the many favelas of the Latin American metropolis, since inside there is a matter closely linked to today. Today you are alive, tomorrow who knows. Nevertheless, its inhabitants are proud and profess a deep sense of belonging, for example, some rappers and dancers who animated the ceremony and who despite the success, continue to live in their favela as well as the Olympic champion, Rafaela Silva, who flaunts proudly both her humble origins and her homosexuality.

The art of arranging is that extra something that pushes you to find surprising solutions even in difficult situations and trouble. The local organizers of the Olympic Games know it well, who have used the territory of Rio to show the beauty of this territory to the world, with cycling and triathlon races between the heights of Vista Chinesa, Ipanema and Copacabana, with the time trial in Pontal, another wonderful beach, less famous and advertised, but wilder and more fascinating with rowing in the Lagoa de Freitas, one of the most enchanting areas of Rio.

The art of arranging also means building the MTB and BMX trails (a jewel destined to be invaded by the surrounding nature) on the rare hillsides, in close proximity to one of the most flammable favelas and with the logical consequence of having to arm the area with tanks, Frisian horses, and hundreds of militias and agents. However, in spite of the international crisis, the fear of Islamic attacks, Zika virus, the potential traffic problems and everything else, the days from 5 to 21 August fled more quickly than the 100 meters of Usain Bolt, far more than the two weeks spent in the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi.

Sochi-Rio, two armored editions, but with a substantial difference: the radiant, authentic disarming smile of Brazilians, able to make you accept everything or almost: If something did not work, just look into the eyes of the

nearest Volunteer to understand his sense of mortifying: looks that seemed to say: we would like, but we cannot.

So what to do? Are you angry with the people who smile? No! Remember to have attended the inaugural ceremony and the picture in which the “jeitinho” was celebrated and then make do as you can, you too.

Therefore, on the first day of the race, you get up happy to be able to comment on the male race on the road, where you expect great things from Fabian Cancellara, the heroic Spartacus, arrived at the end credits of an exciting movie. You can tolerate stoically the 75-minute transfer with the Olympic bus, undergo the ritual control over the metal detector, a much more laborious and frustrating operation for those who like me have a titanium hip prosthesis and it plays regularly like Santa’s sleigh.

You are looking for the Press Room where you can retrieve your starting list, discovering that none of the

volunteers can give it to you. Then, finally, you come to your comment post knowing that you are outdoors, without any shelter, so you have brought a huge cellophane roll under which you can pick up and protect the equipment from a short circuit in case it rains. However, you are immersed in the hottest day of the Brazilian winter, compared to an element of which you underestimated the effects.

The sun. Without water and no protective cream, you are about to face a chronicle which for over 6 hours will nail you to your stool. Not bad, you say, at the bottom of the classics of the North you have experienced worse and you survived. Uh no, this is where you are wrong. Time passes, the sun moves round, the more the race advances, and the more you will be urged to comment on live images that are approaching the total black.

What a poor figure. You think that at home comfortably placed on the couch in front of a HD TV the audience even sees the drop of sweat flowing on Richie Porte's cheek. You do not see anything and you start sweating, for the atrocious heat, but especially for the rising tension.

"Jeitinho jeitinho let me have a little help"

Said and done, there are groups of chroniclers who are looking for obscuring elements. After a few minutes,

you will find yourself 100 years before, when the photographers hid under a black cloth to take the picture. You are not as comfortable as in a Tour de France or Giro d'Italia, but it does not matter, you see clearly Cancellara who goes uphill, who runs in downhill, you see Nibali falling and Van Avermaet who wins. Your honor is safe.

Thanks to Brazil, thanks to "jeitinho", also on behalf of my colleagues. About colleagues, in every story, also with a happy conclusion, there is always a pinch of frustration, when you find that someone has arranged better than you do. Amongst the various fortune constructions, one stands out from the others, thanks to the lightness and momentum of the blue panel folded very well and anchored with ropes and carabiners.

It does not seem to have come out of a favela, like everyone else, reminds me of a fair sailing ship of another age. However, you do not shed a tear and you console yourself soon, thinking that the authors and beneficiaries of such beauty are RAI commentators, Francesco Pancani and Silvio Martinello. Is not Italy one of the magic places of design?

There is no match against them.
What a nice **"jeitinho"**!

THE COMMITMENT OF IOC FOR REFUGEES

Following an invitation from Refugee Olympic Team athlete Yusra Mardini, IOC President Thomas Bach congratulated students of the graduating class of the "Sportschule im Olympiapark – Poelchau Oberschule" in Berlin.

The sports school is located on the premises of the Berlin Olympic Park where the Olympic Games 1936 were held, and all its students are high-performance athletes.

Addressing the 50 students at the graduation ceremony, the IOC President said:

"Congratulations on your graduation from this outstanding school, which is open to the world and is so inspirational because of its location. Your school is sending a message on the importance of the values of sport. Here you had the privilege to combine education with learning

the values of sport. You more than deserve your certificates today."

Learning by doing is the secret of sport, the IOC President went on to say. Entering a new stage in their lives, the graduates will now realise what they have gained through sport.

"Always stay open to try out new things," President Bach told them. "The values of sport will help you overcome many hurdles in life. Thanks to sport, I am sure you will not approach a task and say 'I will never make it', but instead you will ask 'How do I make it?' The passion for excellence that you have learned through sport will serve you well for new challenges ahead of you."

Poelchau Oberschule is one of 43 sports schools in Germany. Many Olympians and successful German





athletes attended school there. One of them is Annika Schleu, a modern pentathlete who also joined the graduation ceremony in Berlin today. She finished in fifth place at the Olympic Games Rio 2016, but after a doping case involving another competitor, she now moves up to fourth place. President Bach surprised her by presenting her with her official diploma. He told her: "I watched your final in Rio and was so impressed with how you competed and jumped from 19th to fifth place. Now you have even moved up to fourth. Congratulations again on your success at the Olympic Games Rio 2016."

Before attending the graduation ceremony, the IOC President gave his support to a countrywide initiative called "School against racism – school with courage," which the Poelchau Oberschule officially joined today. He was joined by Schleu and Maurice Jüngling, a member of the German national water polo team.

"Through sport you can do a lot for courage and against racism. This is the true meaning of sport. In sport, we are all the same and follow the same rules. The message of sport is a message against racism," President Bach said. "Sport and racism do not go together." He

also donated 5,000 euros to the project. To date, 2,434 German schools have joined the initiative.

The IOC President also toured the school together with Mardini, her coach Sven Spannekrebs and school principal Matthias-Carsten Rösner. Mardini, who is not a graduate yet, showed him the pool where she prepared for the Olympic Games Rio 2016 and the small room she stayed in when she first arrived in Germany as a refugee from Syria.

President Andreas Wanker of Panathlon Club Innsbruck was pleased to be able to greet in addition to international President Pierre Zappelli, the highest representative of Panathlon, also delegations of Panathlon Club Brixen and that of Graz. In addition, a great value in the event was given by the presence of local notables - Josef Geisler (Tyrol's Deputy Governor and Regional Councilor for Sport), Christoph Kaufmann (Deputy Mayor of the City of Innsbruck and Municipal Councilor for Sport), Peter Mennel (Secretary General of the Austrian Olympic Committee) and Peter Lechner (President of the Tyrolean Sports Associations).

This illustrious group animated, with a round table, the first part of the ceremony to which followed the

Fair play includes, among other things, that

- our society must offer everyone the opportunity to practice various sports activities;
- as a purpose, personal development should be the priority;





- in addition to social contact or even health, sports performance belongs to an important orientation of sports activities and a significant learning area;
- also in the competition, one should have an influence not only on the sports skill but also on the personal one;
- sport should not suffer a loss of image through negative news (media), but its values and many positive examples in the sports world must be transmitted and multiplied in a conscious way;
- the value and benefits of volunteering must be recognized by the society and made visible - volunteering has a great value as the most important pillar of sport.

In the second major part of the ceremony, Panathlon International President and President of Panathlon Club Innsbruck rewarded the following projects of the Tyrolean Associations:

“Sport fair bindet Österreich” (Sport is obligatory for Austria) (for women and girls for whom, due to bad general conditions, access to the sports activity is difficult or impossible),

“Fairness & Fun” (here, through the famous dodgeball

game, with changed rules, geared to fair play, students learn the basic skills of society as fair play, justice, respect, and socialization),

“Fussball gegen Rassismus” (football against racism) (This project makes it possible for a team formed exclusively by refugees to participate in the activity of the championships),

“Wiffzack” (for students of special pedagogical centers) as well as the personal commendation of Winfried Sponring (Founding Member of the PC of Innsbruck, several times president, also for several years and for many years District President) conferred by Presidents Pierre Zappelli and Andreas Wanker.

To end the event, all honor guests and the majority of visitors accepted the offer to sign the Panathlon Declaration on Ethics in Youth Sport and thereby opening a new way to get involved in sporting values and be an example. The beautiful evening that took place in the Tyrol’s ORF environment has also become a visual event for the aesthetic representations of the group of the vault world champions of Pill.

To “The Black Hurricane” (L’Uragano Nero) the Bancarella Sport Prize

The journalist Marco Pastonesi, with “The Black Hurricane”, is the winner of the fifty-fourth edition of the Bancarella Sport Prize. The prize was awarded on Saturday, July 15, in Republic Square, Pontremoli, at the end of a traditionally enthusiastic and exciting event that saw the participation of numerous panathletes. A DREAMY PRIZE-LIST

Panathlon Club Grenoble Alpes pays tribute to a great athlete in Grenoble

David SMETANINE was born on October 21, 1974 in Grenoble, he won medals 4 times in the 4 Olympic Games and he is among the top 5 medalists on the planet. In September 2008, he won the first French gold medal in the Beijing Paralympic Games in the 100 m freestyle in 1 min 24 s 47. Equally similar to the athlete Hesse El Hannouni, he returned from these games with the most important record of the French delegation: two gold medals and two silver medals (he also holds four European records in the 50, 100 and 200 meters freestyle and 50 m backstroke).

His ranking is impressive:

- A bronze medal at the Athens 2004 Summer Paralympic Games in 50m free style
- The two-time world champion in Durban in 2006 in 100m and 200m freestyle
- Two gold medals and two silver medals at the Beijing Summer Paralympic Games in 2008
- Three gold medals at the 2009 European Championship in Reykjavík in 50 m backstroke, 50 and 100 m freestyle and a silver medal in the 200 m freestyle
- Two silver medals in the 50m and 200m free style and one bronze medal in the 100m free style in S4 category at London's Paralympic Games 2012
- Silver medal in the S4 50m freestyle at the Paralympic Games of Rio in 2016

In 2014, he was a consultant for the Paralympic Games in Sochi for France Télévisions. David SMETANINE was elected to the International Paralympic Committee (IPC), which is the equivalent of the IOC for able-bodied athletes. In this regard, he is committed to the development and media coverage of sport for the disabled. Graduated in Entrepreneurial Science and a Master in Management, Strategy and Engineering of Organizations, he follows athletes in high schools and carries out a sports education program in 2006 for the city of Grenoble that entrusts him with the mission of making the city live through sport.

He was also a Special Advisor to the General Manager for the Services of the Cities of Grenoble where he demonstrated his ability to work for the territory by proposing new actions for economic development. He also contributed to the Universal Exhibition of Shanghai.

After his visit to the Auschwitz camp that will mark him forever, he has committed to sending messages of fraternity, equality and solidarity to young people and has become a sports ambassador demonstrating that integration is also done through sport and that disability isn't a defect, but a force. He is also a sponsor and honorary president of the Handisport David Smétanine Foundation located in Cameroon. It is a laic and apolitical association of humanitarian and sporting nature for the disabled. Its purpose is - Aid and solidarity for all people with disabilities - Promotion of the dignity of the rights of persons with reduced mobility, promotion of the notion of citizenship among their members and promotion of sporting and socio-cultural activities for people with disability.



THE MONSTER IS DOPING

Given the International Graphic Competition Awards - Promising return to graphic works compared to computer processing works

The examination of the works that students from many schools in Italy, Austria, and Brazil have produced for the 15th edition of the competition, offers ideas for thoughts of various kinds.

How do these young artists conceive the sport? What are the concepts and emotions they transmit in their graphic works? What is the educational value of the competition in the light of the results?

These considerations are the guidelines in the work that the Selection Committee follows in examining the works received and selected. In numerical terms, participation in this edition remains on the average values of recent years. One hundred and eighty works presented are not a large number compared to the potential of the competition, and this data must be analyzed to give greater emphasis to the objectives. With satisfaction, a large number of works have been performed with manual techniques - painting and drawing - compared to computer processing, which however cannot be excluded. The manual skill is a benefit in the engagement that students put into trying to translate abstract concepts into images, as are the va-

lues, digging into the fundamental meaning of sport. It is clear that there must be an idea at the origin. When the works are the result of a teaching performed in the classroom, we can see the results. If the graphic contest is an opportunity for growth, a challenge gathered with the awareness of an interesting cultural experience, the quality emerges, even beyond the techniques used. Wherever teachers have followed the work of their students and when the practical application arrives at the end of a discussion and reflection path with speakers and representatives of the Panathlon clubs promoters you can see the difference. In addition, this is the value of the competition: to apply young people to translate concepts graphically learned into their sporting activities and in meetings with champions and experts to help them fully understand the value of sport, as an opportunity for growth towards ethical behaviors to be transferred to life. If many more Panathlon clubs understood the importance of the opportunities offered by the graphic competition and knew how to channel the action towards this last one, that in many cases they have already brought into schools,

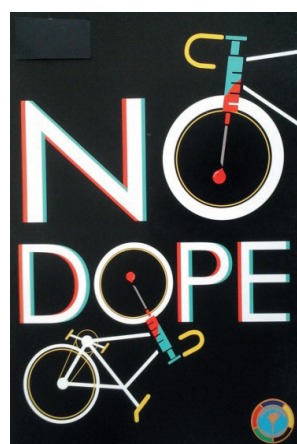

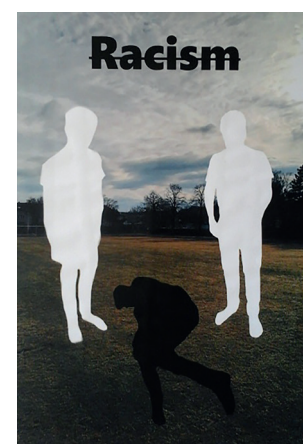

the results that would result from this event for the Foundation and the Districts of P.I. could significantly enrich the presence of our movement in the panorama of international and national projects alongside big sports organizations and cultural institutions that deal with sport. For the sixteenth edition of the competition, the Foundation has already announced the notice of competition, which introduces some novelties, such as incentives for participating schools.

There are also incentives for clubs that will involve high schools in their area. No to racism and doping, individual responsibility, sport for all, are the themes represented in the works of the winners. In the exhibition that will be set up at the awards ceremony in autumn in Venice, however, there will be references to values such as fair play, solidarity and equal opportunities. The awarded works are very different, including abstract works, strong ideas and direct messages. In some works, those coming from an Austrian school, the images propose original paths in a sort of chutes and ladders game between the boxes that propose rules and consequences for their failure to respect. Other works have used the plasticity of bodies or pop compositions. In almost all of the representations, the positive message of sport is perceived and it can be said that in many cases the goals are centered and consistent with the many slogans - perhaps too

many - that accompany the graphics. In the category of "painting and drawing" the first place is for an ink drawing on paper of pure fantasy and executed with sophisticated and patient technique to "defeat the beast" of doping in a bloody and extravagant fight.

"Sometimes you win, sometimes we learn" is the message of the computer processing work that won in this category. The image is serene and everyone is riding a bike to a common destination, without distinction of color, gender, with the spirit of inclusion and sharing. In conclusion, an edition that proposed issues dear to Panathlon. In general, less attention was paid to people with disabilities. Doping always occupies a major place. Obviously, the danger it poses is worrying. Even fair play has been represented with a certain effectiveness. Now we are preparing for the XVI edition of the competition.

The Ambassadors of the Foundation will be in the field to raise the awareness of clubs and leaders on the value of the graphic competition. The Secretariat of the Foundation will be engaged in a coordinating action, which is proposed to increase the number of students who apply themselves to non-trivial work and full of suggestions.

The Olympic champion, Daniele Masala, Professor of ethics in sport



A day worthy of the values of sport and family, with applause, music, vintage movies, awards, interviews, autographs, photo memories and, above all, many useful reflections. For the "Charter of duties of parents in sport" it was a great presentation, which occurred in Reggio Calabria, in the Monteleone Room of the Regional Council, at the initiative of the Panathlon Club in the town of the Strait of Messina.

The event, presented with the microphone by Anna Foti, had an exceptional testimonial: the Pentathlon world champion and several times Olympic champion, Daniele Masala, one of the most eclectic athletes of the Italian sports world, today a professor of communication and ethics in sport at the University of Cassino. The sports classrooms of four schools promoted the event, which has benefited from the sponsorship of the Regional Assembly and CONI Calabria: the scientific high school "Volta", the boarding school Tommaso Campanella, Carducci-Vittorino in Feltre, the industrial high school "Panella-Vallauri" with their flags and their delegations.

The great formative message that comes out of the "Charter of duties of parents in Sport" was presented in their opening remarks by President of the Regional Council, Nicola Irto, by city Councillor Giovanni Latella (delegated by Mayor Falcomatà), the representative of CONI Irene Pignata, Panathlon International Area 8 Antonio Laganà, journalist of Rai, Tonino Raffa, President Panathlon Club Reggio. The sociologist, Antonio Marziale wrote the basic report, guarantor for childhood and adolescence of the Region Calabria, who explained all the points of the manual, remembering that it represents a "compass" to promote the lives of families in a heal-

thy way, and to give responsibility to many mothers and dads who pour out strong pressures on their children. "We cannot claim - he added - that our children are all heirs of Pelé, Maradona or Messi. You can win in the same way, succeeding in being champions in life, combining the rules of ethics and fair play daily. "Afterwards, Daniele Masala continued the speech.

After commenting, with the sliding images on the screen, his most exciting victories (the victories in the 1982 and 1986 World Championships, the two memorable gold medals at the Los Angeles Olympics in 1984 and the silver one in Seoul four years later), he exhorted the audience to recognize in grassroots sport one of the happy places of our country.

The Italian champion said, "The advent of the Internet, the frantic use of the tablets, of the phones and other technologies has favoured alienation processes that need to be fought. Boys close in a virtual world. There is, on the other hand, a real world full of values and educational meanings. A world that teaches us not to live with the obsession of victory at all costs.

This can only come after a life of sacrifices. It is therefore necessary to educate the kids about the culture of defeat, to make it clear that sport is the most beautiful metaphor for life's knowledge. "Masala concluded by saying to parents: Do not be afraid of your children's defeats! From those can be born lessons for the victories of the day after." The closing part of the event was for the prizes. Two prestigious members of the club, Professor Giuseppe Pellicone and Magistrate Giuseppe Viola delivered a memorial plate of Panathlon Reggio Calabria to Masala.

In Ragusa, the literary festival “At Full volume” closes with record numbers

At the literary festival “At FULL VOLUME”, which came to the eighth edition and where the “Extra Volume” section is inserted, this year Panathlon Club of Ragusa has presented, together with some local sponsors, a very original text entitled “CUGINI MAI” (Never Cousins) written by the journalist of “Corriere” of Bologna, Enrico Schiavina and presented by journalist of LA7 Ugo Francica Nava in the well-known TPCO Restaurant in Saint John square, in the presence of President Eugenia Spata, of many members and an interested public.



The event that takes place mainly in the historical centers of Ragusa Superiore and Ragusa Ibla, between squares, alleys, streets and historic buildings combines well with the architectural beauties the fascination of the books.

The book tells of several episodes, collected in the 50 years of derby between Fortitudo Bologna and Virtus Bologna, of wonderful victories and tragic defeats arrived at the last second of the regular times and, finally, of two cousins who by pure case were born in two opposite sides, or by their decision or sympathy, they start playing basketball, preferring the team they are most inspired by, often by making fun of each other, but at the end having both the same age and above all, being relatives, they care about each other.

The Trafficking of Baby football players

In terms of football, money, ethics and exploitation of the weakest, let us note this book, not to be missed because it is in line with panathletic values.

The author, Stefano Scacchi, with the moral support of Fiona May, gives voice to a complaint that is not new, but which has never been sufficiently heard that of the human trafficking of baby footballers who are nailed to often-miserable destinies by unreasonable contracts that are signed by imprudent and ignorant families. This concerns not only the children of families emigrated from all over the world and therefore exposed to any blackmail, but also Italian families who are deluded by devious mediators. Based on a supposed football talent, children who are not yet teenagers become a genuine commodity exchange by unscrupulous operators and then abandoned to the first failure to a destiny of disappointment and misery.

The first Italian inquiry into the human trafficking of baby footballers in our country, coming from the poorest parts of the world, Latin America, Africa and Asia.

A millionaire turnover involving the world of betting, football schools, a number of intermediaries, families of hundreds of athletes and not least, the dreams and ambitions of young football talents who have learned to play football in the poor peripheries of the world.

Through a rigorous inquiry, Stefano Scacchi deals with the complexity of this phenomenon, with no preconceptions and without rhetoric, examining the exemplary cases, from amateurs to the first division.

Stefano Scacchi is a journalist, born in Novara in 1973 and collaborates with "Repubblica", "Avvenire" and "Guerin Sportivo".

He wrote "Gli sciucchi del pallone" (edition 2007), "Il cercatore d'oro in Ogni maledetta domenica" (Minimum Fax 2010) and "A 48 tornanti dal paradiso" (Ediciclo 2017).

For UEFA, fair play is simply financial

The idea of financial fair play stems from the fact that the disparities between sports clubs, in modern football, are increasingly due to an economic factor rather than to a sporting one. In addition to this, UEFA executives realized that the indebtedness that the sports clubs face is often due to enormous expenses during the campaign of transfer market.

Among other things, it is likely that were the negotiations of Real Madrid in 2009 to move definitively UEFA leaders. During that time, the president of Real Madrid, Florentino Pérez, was the protagonist of an unprecedented spending that ended with the purchase of Cristiano Ronaldo for 94 million euros. In addition to being a costly choice, the purchase symbolized the great power of big sports clubs compared to a more economically limited competition. UEFA presented financial fair play as one of the eleven values that this federation promotes. Michel Platini immediately became one of the major promoters and he considered it essential since birth for the well-being of football: ***one goal with far-reaching implications as it is in the interests of the game as a whole if all the clubs play by the rules, comply with the financial fair play criteria and achieve a sustainable financial balance, making passion agree with reason. (Michel Platini)***

Objectives

- To introduce more discipline and rationality in club football finances;
- To encourage the self-sustainability of sports clubs, especially in the long run
- To stimulate growth of infrastructure
- To stimulate growth of youth sectors
- To encourage sports clubs to compete only within their own profits
- To ensure that sports clubs honor their financial commitments at predetermined times
- To reduce pressures on wage demands and transfers
- To limit the effects of inflation in the football world.

The official manual of UEFA financial fair play was also drafted, which explains everything in detail. To ensure that all objectives are met, a Financial Control Panel has been set up, consisting of eight independent experts and a president, which controls the proper application of the UEFA Pro License criteria.



Monitoring of sports clubs

UEFA will control the sports clubs from 2011 until the beginning of the 2014 sports season, based on three key points:

1. Absence of arrears against other sports companies, employees and / or authorities
2. Providing financial information about the future
3. The obligation to balance the budget

Sports clubs that have not achieved their goals in 2014 will risk being unable to participate in UEFA competitions anymore. Michel Platini and other UEFA leaders have often focused on point 3, believing it is crucial that sports clubs do not have to invest lots of money if their earnings are insufficient. In any case, the legislation still leaves a margin of tolerance in the management of any operating losses, allowing losses of up to EUR 5 million, plus other special exceptions until 2018 for losses of 45 to 30 million, if covered promptly by the relevant shareholders. “

There have always been clubs that are richer than others and there doubtless always will be. All we want is for clubs – richer and poorer alike – to spend no more than they earn and to balance their books, this being the only sure way for them to survive.”
(Michel Platini)

“The problem is not only that revenues go up, but that costs grow in a way which is exceeding these revenues. For this reason, we have developed the financial fair play rules, as they will certainly reward those clubs that are managed in a proper way. The financial fair play rules basically say, ‘You cannot spend more than you generate’. They will bring back some more rationality in football and they will reward those who play within the rules and have a sound and sustainable business model.”

THE SCROOGE MCDUCKS OF FOOTBALL

Cristiano Ronaldo (Real Madrid), 87.5 million euros.

In the ranking of the 20 most paid players in the world in 2017 (drawn by **France Football**), the Portuguese back to head, behind him the eternal Argentinian rival. Considering the gross profits, bonuses and advertising revenue, the player who earned the most in 2016-17 is the Portuguese striker of Real Madrid.

The top 4 places of the league table are occupied by players in the League, which in total puts 8 players in the top 20; the Premier League is present with 4 other players, then we find the Bundesliga (or rather, only Bayern Munich) with 4 players and the Chinese championship with 4 other players.

Here is the complete ranking of the 20 best-paid players in the world in 2017 according to the rankings of the French magazine. An amazing 2016 for the Portuguese soccer player, and not just for the successes (Champions League, European Cup with the national football team and the Golden Ball) in the field. The contract renewal up to 2021 of approximately 21 million euros net (44 million gross) with Real Madrid and the one with Nike for life have allowed CR7 to be at the top of the league table of France Football: without counting other earnings from commercial agreements, such as those with Pokerstars and Clear, and investments in hotels that carry his name.



Lionel Messi (Barcelona), 76.5 million euros

The king lost the crown. Cristiano Ronaldo interrupted the dominance of the Argentine champion, also because, unlike the rival, Barcelona's talent still awaits the contract renewal (which expires in 2018) with Catalans. Meanwhile, he is able to console himself with sponsors such as Adidas, Huawei, Gatorade, Pepsi, Pringles, Tata Motors, Turkish Airlines and Gillette, among others.

Neymar (Barcelona), 55.5 million euros

For the fourth time in a row on the podium, the Brazilian champion of Barcelona is ranked third in the top

20 most paid players in the world 2017: after exceeding the threshold of 40 million euros last season, in the last year he exceeded 50 million. He could be closer to Messi if only his contract was not fully guaranteed for 25 million euros per season: France Football, in fact, has only included the fixed line of 15 million net, and not the bonuses of another 10 million. Any comparison today is upset by 222 million paid by Paris Saint Germain to Barcelona to buy Neymar.

Gareth Bale (Real Madrid), 41 million euros

The Welsh champion jumps from 7th place in 2016 to the podium, thanks to the massive renewal with Real Madrid and the sponsorship agreement with Nissan.

Ezequiel Lavezzi (Hebei Fortune), 28.5 million euros

The first of the “Chinese” is the Argentine champion, former player of Napoli and Paris Saint Germain: the striker today at Hebei Fortune will bring home 27.5 million gross per season from the contract with the club of the Chinese Super League.

Oscar (Shanghai SIPG), 25.5 million euros

The Brazilian football player, former champion of Chelsea, was the most expensive negotiation in the latest winter market: he flown from England to China for 67.8 million euros. The engagement is not fair behind, of 23 million plus 10 million bonus at the time of signing: in this case, however, France Football only considers the first 6 months of salary with the t-shirt of Shanghai SIPG.

Zlatan Ibrahimović (Manchester United), 25.1 million euros

The move from Paris Saint Germain to Manchester United has lowered the ranking of the Swedish champion, who has risen from 4th to 7th in the ranking of the 20 most paid players in the world 2017: due to the contract with the Red Devils of “only” 14.6 million euros annually.

Thomas Müller (Bayern Munich), 23.5 million euros

The German striker is no longer the player with the highest salary in the Bundesliga (16 million euros), but he is the most attractive at sponsorship level, as the agreement with Barilla shows.

Andres Iniesta (Barcelona), 23.5 million euros

Toni Kroos (Real Madrid), 23.5 million euros

Real Madrid has locked him with a renewal of 20 million gross euros per season: the rest is made by the sponsorship agreement with Adidas, PlayStation and Sony.

If football is a sport...

Football is the most popular sport in the world. Surely in the western world, especially in Europe, while it is digging new trenches increasingly to the east.

It is an indisputable stereotype if for sport we mean overcrowded stadiums, visceral cheering, popular passions lit up to the top of every bell tower.

However, the sport that Panathlon announces and defends is something else. It is an organization based on values but not on the monetary, financial and speculative ones. True sport is based on moral values that ignite the culture of peoples and not the flares in the stadiums. The sport that the Panathlon Charters frame and proclaim is a human, non-muscular comparison exercise, inviting dialogue to non-division in the name of a different color t-shirt. In addition, sport is also a behavioral code based on fair play and a healthy and serene lifestyle, not instigating those who belong to a different faction; it is a hand that is stretched out towards everyone, not a header in the stomach or an elbow strike in the teeth or a spit in the face or a rostrum of cleats stuck in a shin.

The weekly practice of football has accustomed us to this and much worse in the liturgy of the championships of each category. True sport is a formative school that prepares for life and does not offer any concession

to death, as unfortunately happens occasionally on the margins and within the football stadiums.

222 million for neymar: a scandal

To complete the set of doubts about the legitimacy of being called sport, football adds the heavy burden of financial constraints that support scandalous engagements and foment episodes of corruption of all kinds.

The summer scandal comes from Paris Saint Germain, which paid Barcelona € 222 million to have the Brazilian champion, Neymar, for 5 years. Later, most likely, there will be a new immoral offer from some other club.

One wonders if the soccer planet is part of which universe with its hyperbolic numbers of engagements of individual players, with capitals that would fuel economic activities capable of employing millions of people. In a world where poverty stifles increasingly large groups of people, where work is missing and the future of young people is no longer certain, not even for the best and willing youth, there is who brings home every day the first prize of the New Year's Lottery, just because he knows how to kick the soccer ball with a more "topspin".

He finds immoral leaders and patrons who do not hesitate to cover him with gold as long as he covers them with goals.

There is no dignity and there is no respect for the rest of humanity with serious difficulties of survival. Look at the table of the ten most paid players in the world in the current year. If you are real panathletes, you can tell what feeling prevails in you in front of this scale of monetary values, in an absolute void of moral values. In the season when this newspaper comes out, the market is still open, so the figures may change. Increasing, of course. Beyond the numbers, what will not change is the shame of calling such a world with the name of sport.
